Macufe, which is an acronym for the Mangaung African Cultural Festival is Bloemfontein's answer to cultural festivals such as the Klein Karoo National Arts Festival in Oudtsoom or the Aardklop Festival in Potchefstroom. Mangaung is the traditional Sesotho name for the Free State city, meaning 'Place of Cheetahs', and given the festival's focus on Africa, it's fitting that the name should incorporate Bloemfontein's traditional African name.

While the 2014 theme is yet to be made public, Macufe's 2013 theme was 'When your heart and soul are African'. The theme is used to guide the festival towards its aim of being the 'biggest, most culturally balanced showcase of African arts and culture in the world'. It does this by rounding up some of the best local and international artists across disciplines to show off the talent that comes out of Africa and also remind people of all that Bloemfontein has to offer the world.

The festival is spread out over a roughly 9 day period. During this time, attendees from all corners of the earth will have a chance to experience some of the best and most interesting aspects of African culture. There will be showcases of art, music, theatre, crafts and even sport among other things, spread across venues dotted throughout the city of Bloemfontein. Tickets are sold for individual events and the prices vary (from free entry to R300) depending on the type of show it is.

Some aspects of the festival, such as the Macufe Film Week and the development performances of drama and poetry will run for a week at a time, while other events such as the Macufe Cup sporting event, the Macufe Comedy Festival and the gospel choir performance will be for one day only.

While the festival line-up is varied and acts have been selected to appeal to a broad spectrum of people, there is no doubt that certain events at Macufe will attract more of a crowd than others. Music is one of those things that almost anyone can appreciate, thus the headline event which tops off the Macufe Festival on its very last night is a grand finale music concert. Last year this event featured the likes of Hugh Masekela, Keri Hilson, Jimmy Dludlu, Lira, Mafikizolo and Khaya.

The Macufe Festival is an initiative of the Free State Provincial Government which came into being in 1997. In the time since the inaugural festival, Macufe has experienced the usual growing pains, but with over 10 years to its name, the Macufe Festival is proving to be a popular cultural affair proving that Bloemfontein's got culture too!
