### QUESTION 1: Below, find an excerpt from a research proposal. Considering the excerpt, respond to the questions that follow:

The use of Information and communications technologies (ICTs) is essential to build capacity in education (Department of Education, 2004). This is also one of the strategic thrusts for the national development plan focusing on the development of 21st century skills in the information age. ICTs offer many new learning opportunities. A selection of Web 2.0 technologies are freely available to users including social software and applications which allow users to share, collaborate and interact with one another. However, not all schools in South Africa are able to offer ICT enriched teaching and learning opportunities. Primary schools in general are battling with ways in which to introduce innovations that excite learners. Barriers to entry include budget constraints, a shortage or lack of trained staff and technical support, and the lack of ability and creativity on the side of the educator. These are also some of the barriers exposed in the 2010 e-maturity survey conducted in Gauteng schools (Amory, 2010; Lautenbach, 2011). Although the school where I am currently employed ranked highly in the abovementioned e-maturity survey in 2010, and was identified as one of the most e-mature schools, educators and learners at the school still do not fully exploit the potential of available educational technologies. In response to this problem, this research is conceived in an attempt to challenge both educators and learners to engage with educational technologies and to transform their teaching and learning strategies. Although this intervention could have been implemented in any learning area I have chosen to use my own field of interest as a focus for this study. As a second language specialist I have conceived the learning activities for a section of the syllabus to include the conceptualization and production of multimedia videos in a second language using available technologies. In this process learners will be challenged to actively participate in the process of activating and transforming their own learning.

Child fosterage – the practice in which children leave their birth families to live with other members of their extended community – is a long established practice in South Africa. Traditionally the process involves a reciprocal relationship, with the child providing domestic help in return for care, financial support and other assistance. Increasingly, however, agents are using this traditional practice to recruit girl children and then to traffic them into domestic labour. In place of the promised care and assistance, these children are vulnerable to exploitation and abuse

Researchers designed a questionnaire-based study to identify the challenges related to reproductive health among girls aged between 13-17 years who live outside of their family home and do domestic labour. They also want

to find out about their family background, how they were recruited, the type of work they are expected to do as labourers, their "relationship" with their "employees". Of course some questions are personal and probing.

Trained interviewers move house to house and inquire whether there are any children in this age group in foster care that do domestic chores. If the answer is positive they then use some deception to explain that they are doing a study on the health needs of fostered children and ask permission from the foster parent to interview the child. They then ask the child for signed informed consent. To minimize risks to the children they are then interviewed in private. Each interviewer will have a "safe" interview schedule to revert to in case the foster parent/employer should enter the room. The children are prepared for this possibility...
